- 3. Are there different expectations for sons and daughters in Spain?
- 4. Is it generally considered socially acceptable for men and women to behave in the same way, or are there some differences?
- 5. Read the statement below. Do you agree with Graham Briggs?


## Women and the vote

## Woman idioms

Ask your students to identify which one of the definitions given best describes the following idioms (the correct answer is highlighted in red) and to find 3 other idioms online that contain the word woman.

(to be single, to make your own decisions, to be married)
